WHAT IS THE LICENSING SCHEME?

new Licensing Scheme, which is part of the Health and Care Act 2022.



This means that it is **part of the law** (i.e. once in force, this legislation will make it an offence to perform particular procedures without a licence)

The most recent and very important bit of regulation is the

PRACTITIONERS The regulations will prohibit an individual in England from carrying out specified cosmetic

The regulations will prohibit a person from using

procedures in the course of business, unless the person has a personal licence;

or permitting the use of premises in England for the carrying out of specified cosmetic procedures in the course of business unless the person has a premises licence


